#### Aim of the seminar

Contemporary democracies face a number of challenges and paradoxes in a rapidly changing world. Although, democracy, both as an ideal and as a set of political institutions and processes, has prevailed in most countries of the world, there has been a general downward trend in electoral interest and participation. Also, while the substance of politics has rapidly globalised in key areas such as security, economy, trade, environment etc., the process of politics has not. Principal stakeholders remain firmly rooted at the national or even local level. Democratisation as an open-ended process consist of transitions and transformation processes, whose outcome is crucial for world peace and for people's wellbeing. The European Inter University Centre for Human Rights and Democratisation has invited two eminent specialists to discuss this topic: Professor Vital Moreira, Member of the European Parliament, Chairman of the Committee on International Trade, and Justice Albie Sachs, from the Constitutional Court of South Africa.

By organising this special event the European Inter-University Centre for Human Rights and Democratisation (EIUC) aims at promoting a better understanding of human rights issues and actively supporting the United Nations' International Year of Human Rights Learning, 2009. In addition a series of lecturers in Venice will be co-sponsored with the Cà Foscari University of Venice within the common area of interest of international relations.
